There is much to see and do on site tonight – this is just a snapshot of what you can expect!

- 1. Visitor Centre, Museum Shop-** Admissions purchase tickets! Start your trip at our exhibit Aabnaabin: Looking Back To Where We Come From. Stop by the MacKelvie Gallery to see the Kawartha Truth and Reconciliation Support Group Quilt.
- 2. Milburn House-** Drop in at the Milburn house. Mrs. Milburn is getting ready for bed and has her finest and warmest sleepwear. Step into the parlour to see what the ladies are working on; they have an essential job to get done.
- 3. Hastie Carpenter Shop-** The Carpenter is working late into the evening finishing his work. Ask him what he is working on and see how his project is coming along.
- 4. Tinsmith Shop-** Strike up a conversation with our Tinsmith who is hard at work making lanterns for sale. A much safer option than open candles, tin lanterns almost magically lit up a space allowing farmers to easily do evening chores, such as milking the cows or sharpening tools.
- 5. Fitzpatrick House-** As the fall winds begin to blow outside, settlers in the evening are hard at work preparing the bread dough for the next day. Try a sample of the bread cooked today. *Out Front:* Enjoy the melodic harp music as it blows down Hope Street.
- 6. Fife Cabin-** Learn about the sleeping arrangements of early settlers. *At the Fire Pit:* Gather around the fire to see how early settlers made popcorn.
- 7. Register Print Shop-** Learn how difficult it is to typeset at night, see if you can read the font.
- 8. Keene Hotel-** A delicious selection of baked goods for sale. Stop by the kitchen for a refreshing drink or a bite to eat. *Parlour:* Stop in on the ladies in the parlour and see what evening activities they are doing. *Upstairs:* Learn about sleeping quarters and rope beds and see one in use!
- 9. Menie General Store-** Featuring a selection of old-fashioned candy and toys for sale. Check out an antique clock and time piece display.
- 10. Douro Town Hall / School-** Sit down with the schoolteacher and discover what a schoolhouse becomes at night.
- 11. Glen Alda Church-** Look inside at this lantern lit building and listen to some stories about it's past. If you are lucky, you may even hear a hymn.
- 12. S. W. Lowry Weaver Shop & Jacquard Loom Interpretive Centre-** Try your hand at weaving! See weaving demonstrations and discover how early settlers kept warm in the evening. Musical performances by Rob Cory can be heard on the front porch. Walk through to the back and create a pin lantern for you to take home.
- 13. Peterborough County Agricultural Heritage Building (PCAHB)-** Washrooms, Agricultural Wall of Fame Gallery, and Workshop and Conservation Lab viewing Area.
- 14. Blacksmith Shop-** All around the Village you will see the lanterns hooks made at shop like this.
- 15. Mitchell Building-** (Staff Only Area) Costuming & Check-In.
- 16. Agricultural Barn-** Barns such as this shut down in the evening allowing farmers to rest and recuperate at home after a hard day's work.
- 17. Transportation Barn-** Travel at night is something that most people avoided. However, in an emergency a lantern could be added to a sleigh or wagon to provide some light.
- 18. Trades Barn-** Milk wagons, as seen here, delivered milk around village in the early hours of the morning, allowing people to enjoy their coffee or oats with milk in the morning. Talk to the village broom maker and see how he creates these essential household tools.
- 19. Corner Fire Pit-** Take a seat and join in on the music. If you stay long enough Glen and Phil's folk songs share settlers tales of days gone past.
