1. Admissions

2. Visitor Centre, Museum Shop- An eclectic collection of gift items, souvenirs, candy, and toys. Registration for the Pie Eating Contest. Start your trip at our exhibit Aabnaabin: Looking Back To Where We Come From. *MacKelvie Room:* Check out an antique clock and time piece display, with the Quinte Timekeepers! *Village Entrance:* Enter a draw at the Vintage Film Festival table. Stop in at Ben's Kettle Corn for a snack, and then meet the woodturners from the Peterborough Artisan Centre. Lang's Apple and cider sale booth here!

3. Milburn House- Apples make a delicious addition to baked treats! Try a piece of pioneer apple cake and learn how it was baked in the past using a woodstove. Visit with members of the Peterborough Quilt Guild and see some of their examples of Circuit Riders.

4. Hastie Carpenter Shop- Storage of apples for the winter was important! Hear about how barrels were made by Village coopers, then go to the Apple Orchard to see how apples were stored in them!

5. Tinsmith Shop- Learn how tinsmiths made simple apple corers to ease the work of apple preparation.

6. Fitzpatrick House- Cooking over an open fire and serving samples of apple butter.

7. Fife Cabin- Learn about how the settler's dyed their clothes at our natural dye demonstration. Discover some of the folklore around apples, and ways they have been used superstitiously through the years.

8. Register Print Shop- Check out how some traditional harvest prints are transferred onto paper – for newspapers, magazines, and books.

9. Keene Hotel- A delicious selection of baked goods for sale including apple crisp, fritters, and pies. Stop by the kitchen for a refreshing drink or a bite to eat. *Upstairs Salesman Room:* Display of fall fair homecrafts.
10. Village Green- North End: Personalize your very own apple cider coaster, as a souvenir of your trip! South End: We challenge you to a game of Apple X's and O's. *Middle:* Help us prepare for the winter, stuffing mattresses and testing them out.

11. Menie General Store- Take home some candy apples from the General Store market, as well as a selection of games and toys. See if you can spot some pioneer items used for preserving food!

12. Douro Town Hall / School- Participate in an apple lesson!

13. Glen Alda Church- Hear the sweet refrain of harvest hymns on the pump organ. *Outside:* Visit with the Northumberland Rug hookers and see their exhibit. Do you have the dexterity for this craft? Try it for yourself!

14. Church Drive Shed- Threshing and fanning mill demonstrations, see the steam engine in action.

15. S. W. Lowry Weaver Shop & Jacquard Loom Interpretive Centre- Try your hand at weaving! See the Lang Weavers as they dress the looms preparing them for their next production.

16. Blacksmith Shop- Demonstrations by the Village blacksmith.

17. Ayotte Cabin- Reenactor Encampment.

18. Peterborough County Agricultural Heritage Building (PCAHB)- Washrooms, and Agricultural Wall of Fame Gallery. *Great Hall:* Chili sales, while supplies last.

19. South Lake School- See if you can bob for apples from the schoolhouse tree.

20. Horsepower- Try your hand at an old-fashioned apple peeler!

21. Cheese Factory- Learn how cheese was made in the 1800's. Fresh Empire cheese curd and homemade bread for sale.

- 22. Cider Barn- See how apples are pressed into cider, making this sweet Autumn treat.
- 23. Mitchell Building- (Staff Only Area) Costuming & Check-In.
- 24. Stump/Stone Pullers- Watch and learn how logs were hand hewn for construction.

25. Agricultural Barn- Look inside the barn to see the equipment farmers would have used to gather the fall harvest.

26. Transportation Barn- See the many types of 19th - century vehicles, used through various seasons, to transport farm goods, and people.

- 27. Trades Barn- See how corn is turned into brooms on a "New Era Broom Making Machine."
- **28.** Sheep Pen- Sheep shearing demonstrations throughout the day.
- 29. Lang Grist Mill- Visit the Miller and learn how wheat is ground into flour.





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
